Fort Ti to celebrate Scots Day June 17

Fort Ticonderoga invites all to explore Scottish history during its annual Scots Day celebration on Saturday, June 17, 2023. The celebration of Scottish history, heritage and culture runs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Discover the heroic stories of Scottish soldiers in the British Army serving at Ticonderoga and North America though the campaigns of the 18th century. Thrill at musket demonstrations that highlight the equipment, clothing and tactics of the red-coated Scottish soldier, during the defining military campaigns that shaped North

Merchants selling kilts, crafts, and other gifts will join Scottish organizations from across the East Coast to greet visitors with information on all aspects of their rich heritage.

Lively performances include pipers, Highland Dance Vermont, and Fort Ticonderoga's Fifes and Drums. The full day of activities will include special guided tours, and a remembrance service on the Carillon Battlefield at the Memorial Cairn. Carillon boat cruises will carry visitors onto the

water to explore the epic historic landscape and its strategic importance during the 18th century.

Beth L. Hill, Fort Ticonderoga president and CEO said: "Fort Ticonderoga has an enduring connection with Scottish history and culture. The reputation of the Black Watch, or 42nd Highland Regiment, was sealed at Ticonderoga during the Battle of Carillon on July 8, 1758. The regiment suffered more than 50% casualties during their assault on the right of the French Lines as part of the British attack. Ever after Ticonderoga has remained a legendary battle honor within the regiment's history."

From the DEC: Give turtles a brake

Each May and June, motorists should be on the alert for turtles crossing the road. Turtles are long-lived and well-adapted to their natural environment, as they can retreat to the safety of their shell when threatened by predators. But a turtle's shell provides no protection against a major cause of mortality, namely being struck by vehicles while crossing roadways according to a press release from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

· Our native turtles are on the move in May and June seeking sandy areas or loose soil to lay their eggs.

· In New York, thousands of turtles are killed each year when they are struck by vehicles as they migrate to their nesting areas

· Most species of land turtles that are native to New York are declining.

· It may take more than 10 years for a turtle to reach breeding age, and since they lay just one small clutch of eggs each year, the loss of a breeding female can have a significant effect on the local population.
